Our 74th National Independence Day celebration will be held at the end of September 2019 which also mark the closing of the **Wonders of Indonesia 2019** series of events.

We are of the view that even though Bulgaria and Indonesia are located on different continents in different parts of the world, through several examples we discover common ground in arts.

I believe, by showcasing Exhibition of Paper Arts, Contemporary Arts, Textiles, Artefacts, Jewelry and Film of our Cultural Heritage and Tradition, as well as the Indonesian Culinary at this special celebration, we will provide the Bulgarian audience with an excellent opportunity to better understand the culture id Indonesia. ## Batik Storytelling - the story of Indonesian batik

The first thing one needs to know when it comes to batik, is about the creation. That one sheet of garment is entirely made of humans' thoughts, imaginations, even emotions.

Indonesian batik, nonetheless, is very rich in patterns. There are various kinds of patterns in every regions--it is impossible to count it and they are different one another.

Among the diversity of patterns, motifs and styles--there are also batik fabrics deliberately designed with storytelling purpose.

Batik storytelling-is a batik cloth depicting various stories or legends. The fabrics becomes the medium for ones to tell a story.

Various stories such as the story of Wali Songo ( the 9 revered saints of Islam) which is very well-known in Indonesia, traditional puppet stories, war story, legenda, fables, even to famous story from around the globe like the Red riding Hood, Flash Gordon, to Chinese mithology--can be found on Indonesian batik.

Making batik cloth as a medium for telling stories or delivering messages, is one of the things commonly encountered in Indonesia.

Thank you to Your Excellency, Indonesian Ambassador to Bulgaria, Ibu Sri Astari Rasjid, who gave me the opportunity to show some of the collection of Batik Storytelling at the **SYNTHESIS**: **Indonesia & Bulgaria exhibition - Heritage Textiles, Artefacts and Jewellery.**



"Wayang" Puppets and Traditional Heritage Textile

#### Left to right:

**GARENG**, Semar's eldest son and ranks second among the punakawan or clown-like servant of the heroes in the shadow-plays.

**SEMAR**: He is one of the most supernaturally powerful characters in the shadow puppet repertoire, due to his deep knowledge.

**PETRUK**, Semar's adopted son. He is tall, long nosed punakawan. He has a sweet face with an attractive smile

**BAGONG**, Semar's youngest son. He always appears as a youth, and defers to nobody, whether a warrior, raja, or god.



Left to right:

**BARONG**. He is a panther-like creature and character in the Balinese mythology of Bali, Indonesia. He is the king of the spirits, leader of the hosts of good, and enemy of Rangda, the demon queen and mother of all spirit guarders in the mythological traditions of Bali.

**ARJUNA**. He is a ksatria (member of the warrior/ruler class) of the Bharata period who has no peer, Arjuna is the son of Pandu Dewanata, raja Astina and Dewi Prita/Dewi Kunti.

**GUNUNGAN**, also known as kayon or kayonan (from kayu, "wood" or "tree") in Bali, is a figure in the Indonesian theatrical performance of wayang e.g. wayang kulit, wayang klitik, and wayang golek. A gunungan is a symmetrical-shaped figure of translucent parchment made of dried, firm beef skin, whose outline is pointed in Java and more rounded in Bali.

**SUBADRA**, is one of the main characters in the epic Mahabharata. He is the daughter of Prabu Basudewa, king of the Kingdom of Surasena.

RANGDA, She is a witch-widow and Queen of Black Magic.



Left to right:

**SANGUT**. He is one of the prominent figures in the Puppet tradition in Bali. Sangut is described has big lips and yellow-skinned. He is the thinnest but has big belly. He often appears with Delem and conducts jokes.

**DALEM**. He has cross eyes, his neck is goiter, and short. He is arrogant, cunning, and big mouth. He was always submissive to the king, but to someone younger he acted arrogant. He is very well known and often appears along with Sangut, having dialogues full of jokes.

**TUALEN**. He is considered to be a clown in contemporary Balinese stories. He is older and more powerful than all the Hindu gods, being really the elder brother of Shiva (Siwa in Balinese). His cognate in Javanese tradition is Semar.

**MERDAH**. He is Tualen's brother, but according to Central Balinese tradition Merdah is one of Tualen's sons. He is often appears with Tualen, doing dialogues full of jokes but full of advice.

**SRIKANDI**: She is a character in the Hindu epic, the Mahabharata. She is the daughter of Drupada. She fought in the Kurukshetra war on the side of the Pandavas, along with his father Drupada and brother Dhristadyumna

**DEWI SHINTA**: Shinta is one of the main characters of the Indian epic "Ramayana", beloved wife of Rama and daughter of king Janaka. Shinta is portrayed as the symbol of female purity and virtue.

**SUMBADRA**: Sister of Krishna and Baladewa, king of Mandura, Sembadra is a gentle and noble character from the Mahabharata epic. She is the first wife of Arjuna and mother of Abimanyu, later one of the first kings of Java.

**DRUPADI**: is the most important female character in the Hindu epic, Mahabharata


